
Chapter 1

Mrs Archer laughed. 'You're just like your dad. When you were a baby, your first word ...'


'... was football,' said Harry. 'I know, Mum!'

'Harry never plays football after school,' said Zoe and laughed.



Zoe liked Harry. He had a nice smile. He was smiling now, with the magazine in his hand. Zoe smiled too and left the room.


'Zoe likes you,' laughed Tom.

'Why do you want to win?' Zoe asked again.


'I want to go to Spain because ...' He stopped again. He didn't want to tell his friends about his mum.

On 22nd June, it was sunny. Harry got up very early, dressed and had his breakfast.


'Good luck,' said his mum. She looked at her watch. 'You need to go. You're going to be late!' She smiled at Harry and he left the flat.

Park station and walked up the street to the hotel. It was a very big hotel and there were lots of people there. Harry spoke to the woman behind the desk.


'Hello. I'm here for the Your Dream Holiday competition,' he said.

'And the hotel?' the man asked again.


'Yes, you need to pay for the hotel,' said Lizzie very quickly. 'Of course you pay for the hotel.'

'Yes,' said Harry. 'Write about my mum. You can tell people why she needs a holiday.'


'Are you sure? Do you want Tom to write about it?' asked Mr Francis.

'Goal!' shouted Harry. He and the girl jumped up and down happily.


'Well done, you two,' said the coach. 'That's good play.'

'Me?' asked Harry.


'Yes you,' said Peter. 'And you can meet the Arsenal team too.'

'Great!' said Peter. He smiled too. 'And this is for you and your friend, Tom.'


He gave Harry an envelope.
