He smiles. 'You're crying and you're angry. But you're very beautiful too. Just one look, Helen. One look and I love you.'




I look at them.



We live in a flat. Mum and Dad drive taxis – that's their job. The taxi office is below our flat.



My head goes hot and my hands go yellow. Then I become<sup>4</sup> the bag. Mum takes me to work with her. She doesn't know the bag is me.






I try with it with a book. I become a book and a boy reads me.

They run out and get in their car. The tall man drives. The short man has the box.


He opens it and looks at the money. He's looking at me, but he doesn't know it.


## **Chapter 5**

'It's the car alarm<sup>6</sup>,' Joe shouts.


'Stop it!' Frank shouts.

'Stop the noise, please,' he says to Joe.




'These men are bad!' I want to tell the policeman. 'They've got our money!' But cars can't talk. For a minute I don't know what to do.

The gun is in Joe's hand. It's near my face now. I'm looking at it.


'Put the gun down,' the policeman says from the street.

'Hey!' says Joe. 'What are you doing?'




Then I open the car door and give the gun to the policeman. I talk in Frank's voice.

Then I am Helen again and Frank is standing next to me. He doesn't look well.




'Where am I?' Frank asks.

'Yes,' I say. 'I think I'm here to help. The police. The world. Anyone who wants my help.'


The voice is in my head again.


'Yes,' it says. 'Yes, that's right. You are here to help people.'
